Year 12 Valediction and End of Year Celebration Assembly

Remembrance Day Assembly

The 100th ceremony was marked at our school by the creation of a poppy field planted by each student on the entrance lawn to our school. It's quite a sight as I'm sure those of us who have been in school in the last week will agree.

Simpson Prize

After a lengthy selection process, essays by Brennan Finch, Grainne O'Connell and Caleb Wallis have been chosen as our school's entries into the Simpson Prize. The Prize is an escorted trip to Gallipoli for the Dawn Service on Anzac Day 2019 for each state winner. The Simpson Prize essay question was - "To what extent could 1918 be considered a year of victory for Australia and its people?"

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AROUND OUR SCHOOL



The Heights School community excelled itself this year in its commemorations of Remembrance Day, particularly celebrating the centenary of the end of the First World War.

Monday 12th November began with an assembly for Year 7 to 11 students and staff in the gym. The event was conducted by four Year 9 students, Husan Ara, Jirah Baker, Karl Groener and Prabhnoor Sandhu. Each made a brief speech about the reasons why they believe that young people today should continue to honour those who have served our country, especially those who have died in that service. They also gave voice to a few World War 1 Diggers who expressed their thoughts around the end of hostilities in November 1918.

Malachi Ashby, resplendent in full MacKay outfit, then played a poignant piece When the Battle is O'er on the bagpipes. His rendition was very moving. Everyone then stood silently for the Last Post service, including the Minute's Silence. It was wonderfully observed, showing students' respect for those who have fallen.

After recess, the Junior School held their Remembrance Day assembly in the courtyard. I was privileged to witness everyone's respectful behaviour as students displayed their poppy artwork and read their Remembrance Day poetry. Once again, Malachi performed to a

mesmerised audience. Then Ms Eastley shared her experiences in the army before she became a teacher. She showed her medals from serving in Kosovo and Afghanistan and explained that hers was a non-combat role and she had lots of fun in the army working with 'big trucks'. This assembly was also a fitting tribute to the men and women of our armed forces, past and present.

All students behaved in an exemplary manner throughout their assemblies. They made the staff feel proud.

A new addition to our commemoration was the creation of a field of poppies on the front lawn of the school. Each student, from Reception to Year 11, and staff member made poppies and wrote a personal message on the back

before planting them in the lawn in the week following the Remembrance Day ceremonies. This was an outstanding collective effort by the entire school community and it was immensely gratifying to watch students as they planted their symbols of remembrance in such a careful and respectful manner. Almost every student wrote a heartfelt message or their name on the back of their poppies. Whether they wrote their names a short tribute like 'Lest We Forget' or 'Thank You' or a more personal message to a loved one, students obviously put a lot of thought and effort into their contribution to our beautiful garden.

There has been many positive comments about the poppy field. It was a wonderful way to bring the students of all year levels and all staff, teachers and SSOs, together and it is sure to become an annual event.

NATIONAL FOOD SAFETY WEEK

Last week was National Food Safety week with the focus this year being on food poisoning. Ms Lempens's Year 9 Food Technology class was able to participate in this week with a visit from Donna Hattam and Allen Catalan, Environmental Health Officers form the City of Tea Tree Gully Council.

They presented some very interesting facts about food poisoning, the causes, the symptoms, while also giving an insight to their role of trying to prevent food poisoning outbreaks in our local area.

Their visit also included a mock set up of a dangerous kitchen, food safety going terribly wrong. A fridge was filled with, mouldy vegetables, raw chicken dripping on vegetables, a mixture of fresh foods on the same chopping board that could lead to cross contamination; they even placed a fake rat in the kitchen, to show the risks of pests in the kitchen.

It was fantastic to see that all our students could pick up all the unsafe practises.

FIRST AID FOR KIDS

Students in Year 6 were fortunate to receive some basic training by St Johns in first aid on Tuesday 6th November. Our Year 5s will be receiving similar training in two week's time.

Students learnt the acronym DRSABCD to remember what to do in a life threatening emergency:

- D Danger
- R Response
- S Send for help
- A Airway
- **B** Breathing
- C CPR
- D Defibrillator

In relation to DRSABCD - students practiced checking for response and putting their peers in a recovery position. Students used dummies to practice chest compressions and learnt 30 to 2 (30 compressions to 2 breaths). They also watched the St Johns presenter use a defibrillator.

As well as this, students were introduced to an Epipen (blue to the sky, orange to the thigh). They learnt about burns and minor amputations (for example they learnt to put a chopped off finger in a plastic zip lock bag or clean jar). Students practiced bandaging for snake bites and most were thrilled to be able to take the bandages they used home to practice on family members.

We are extremely grateful to St Johns for providing this valuable course for our students.
