Big Ideas in Number

On Friday 24th May staff participated in a professional learning program titled the *Big Ideas in Number* facilitated by Professor Di Siemon. The day was designed around the teaching and learning of Mathematics. Topics covered included developing a sense of number, counting, place value, fractions and operations involving addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Although targeted at primary and secondary Maths learning the introductory session was relevant to all teachers. It was a very successful day and we greatly appreciated the time for all staff to work together.

Regular Attendance

The likelihood of success in learning is strongly linked to regular attendance and participation in educational programs.

We are striving to maintain high student attendance rates.

Our students' attendance rate is currently just over 91% and after improving a little from 2015 has plateaued.

The importance of attending school regularly cannot be overstated. Students should have very few days absent each year.

If your child is to achieve a 95% attendance rate this means they are absent for 10 school days per year.

Unless there are exceptional circumstances the number of days absent per year should be very small, no more than a handful and certainly less than 10. If your child is absent from school please account for their absence.

NEW CHANGES TO SCREENING LAWS AS OF 1ST JULY 2019

To all current and future volunteers at The Heights School

Stronger, more effective and transparent screening laws for people working or volunteering with children have been introduced in South Australia. The new screening laws were recommended as part of Federal and South Australian Royal commissions, to help keep children safe in our communities. The new laws mean that from I July 2019 everyone working or volunteering with children must have a valid child-related check.

From 1 July 2019 the state's current system for child-related employment screenings, will be replaced with a working with children check (WWCC). This new check is coming in to better protect children by providing a monitored and more thorough assessment of a person's eligibility to work or volunteer with children. Because the check is monitored, immediate action can be taken if a person is charged with a concerning offence.

A WWCC is valid for five years and is portable across roles and organisations throughout South Australia.

Under the new law, people who have a current, valid DHS/DCSI child-related employment screening can keep using it until it expires. Then they will need to get a WWCC. There is also a 12 month transition period for anyone with a National Police Certificate assessed by their organisation, with the certificate valid till 1 July 2020.

POLICE AND FIRE VISIT THE PRESCHOOL

In Week 3 of this term the Tuesday/Wednesday children had a visit from SA Police and the Fire Fighters from the Golden Grove Fire Station. While the Thursday/Friday children also had a visit from the Golden Grove Fire Fighters.

One of our parents, Senior Constable David Thoirs, organised with his partner Senior Constable Tracey to bring their police car and Senior Constables Richard and Hayley to visit with their police horse, Dakota. The children were able to pat Dakota and go inside the police car, even trying out the siren. The children learnt that the role of the police officer is varied and they are able to help us when we are in trouble.

The fire fighters taught the children what to do if their house was on fire. They practised by dropping down low and go, go, go which you need to do if you are in a fire and need to get out of

the house, we practiced by crawling under a blanket. Next the children practiced covering their faces and rolling on the ground, which is what they need to do if they were on fire (Stop, cover, drop and roll). They learnt that a safe meeting place if there was a fire in your home would be the letter box, so they know that everyone is safe. The children were able to use the

hose, squirting water onto the oval.

YEAR 7 SCIENCE EXCURSION TO THE ZOO



On Thursday the 30th of May, the four Year 7 classes set off to the Adelaide Zoo for a Science excursion.

This term, all classes have been learning about scientific classification of living things. We were able to attend a 1 hour session provided by the zoo, that looked at how they use classification at the zoo and put our knowledge to the test. We also got to see all these animal specimens that the zoo had collected over the years, such as lion fur, snake skins and spikes of an echidna. The teacher also had a blue tongue lizard, that we said hello to.

In Science for the second half of this term, we will be investigating animal habitats and engaging in an Enclosure Design Task. We could use our time at the zoo to identify good enclosures and those that need some work to improve them. Stay tuned for our work!

We also had time to play on the zoo's nature play playground, before visiting the souvenir shop and coming back to school.

After learning all the fine details of making their own pasta they were given the task to create their own pasta dish. Students created dishes such as a ricotta and spinach ravioli, beef tortellini, an amazing pasta salad using spiralis pasta, and the ultimate indulgence, chocolate pasta.
