Strengthening School Community Relationships and the School Complaint Process

Good relationships within the school community give students a greater chance of success. There will be times when people have concerns about what happens at school. When this happens, we would like to encourage an open dialogue with you. To hear your concerns and work out how to address them, we have an established complaint process.

Your child's teacher is usually your first point of call. If the matter involves more than just one teacher, you should be talking with the Year Level Mentor who is overseeing the year level that your child is in. Often this person is not immediately available but they will return your call or make an appointment with you.

In the event of a concern please use the following guidelines:

Steps:

- I. Please report to the front office.
- 2. Arrange a time to speak to the relevant teacher/s about the problem.
- 3. Please do not enter school classrooms or offices about a complaint without prior arrangement.
- 4. Let the teacher know what you consider to be the issue
- 5. Allow a reasonable time for the issue to be addressed.
- Treasurer & OSHC Representative 6. If the issue is not addressed, please arrange a time to speak with your child's Year Level Mentor. Our Year Level Mentors are:

If the matter has not been addressed to your satisfaction, please contact the Principal's Assistant who will record your call and assist you with the school's complaint process. The Principal's Assistant is the first point of contact and will refer the matter to the appropriate Senior Leader, Deputy Principal or Principal as required.

7. If the matter is still unresolved after following the school's complaint process, you may choose to discuss the issue with the Education Complaint Unit, 1800 677 435.

Parents with a concern about School Policy should:

- I. Arrange a meeting time with the Principal to discuss your concern.
- 2. Allow a reasonable time frame for the issue to be addressed.
- 3. If the matter is still unresolved, you may choose to discuss the issue with the Education Complaint Unit, 1800 677 435.



THE HEIGHTS STEPHANIE ALEXANDER KITCHEN GARDEN PROGRAM

We are well and truly into Term I in the Stephanie Alexander (SAKG) program, and our team has hit the ground running! The Reception and Year I classes have now been included in the garden lessons; and the Years 2-6 classes will now have kitchen and garden lessons on alternating weeks.

In the kitchen, our kitchen specialists Gen Lempens and Eva Rose will be focussing on hygiene, kitchen & and food safety practices. We will also begin working on the "Farm to Fork" concept for SAKG in more detail. Students will learn about and explore the supply chains that bring food from the farm to our plates, farming practices and food safety for produce.

In Term 1 so far, we have made 2 bruschetta recipes: a ricotta, lemon, basil and honey bruschetta and a tomato and basil bruschetta. The classes have also been learning about table manners/etiquette and table settings.

In the upcoming weeks we will be making eggplant pizzas served with crunchy fresh salads and different dressings as well as a variety of delicious dips and flatbreads. We look forward to the upcoming harvest of pumpkin, capsicums, quinces, ice-cream fruit, eggplants and figs.

In the garden, our garden specialist Amanda Pryor will be looking at how we can create healthy soil (the best place to start if you want to grow healthy fruit, vegetables and herbs); as well as learning about composting, recycling and many other aspects of gardening and growing our own produce. We will learn how to care for our family of five chickens — Coco, Matilda, Rose-Alena, Princess Layer and Jeff! Our big challenge for the year is to introduce the concept of "NUDE FOOD" to the Heights School community — this teaches our students, their families, and our staff about eliminating all disposable packaging for the food we bring to school (ie. plastic bags, plastic food wrap, aluminium foil, individual foil bags etc). Stay tuned for more information and inspiration!

As always, we have a loyal team of volunteers in both the kitchen and garden, and we are very keen to meet any parents or other family members, and people in our local community who may have a few hours a week to spare.




The current artwork (see photographs) shows how enthusiastic, focused and engaged the students are!

Design Brief:

Client: SA Water

Project: sculpture for the entrance of the water purification plant.

Aims: To incorporate the design elements into a sculpture to represent the three states of water.

Year 10 Design students spent a double lesson brainstorming how to represent the three states of water using only line, colour, value and other elements of design.



From this exercise they were challenged to create a three-dimensional sculpture for the entrance to a fictional SA Water Purification Plant. Some of the solutions demonstrated lateral thinking and creativity by the students and they enjoyed applying their knowledge to a mock real life design brief.

SPACE JOBS FORUM EXCURSION





Parking and Registration


Parking is available in Northey Avenue, Marlborough Street and surrounding streets.

To join Saver Plus, you must be at least 18 years or over, have a child at school or attend vocational education yourself, have regular income from paid employment (you or your partner), have a current Health Care or Pensioner Concession Card and be in receipt of an eligible Commonwealth social security benefit, allowance or payment*



many Centrelink payments are eligible, please contact your local Coordinator for more information.
