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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

R U OK? Day

We are celebrating R U OK? Day this Thursday. Our Student Council with the support of Wellbeing Coordinators Daniel Brzezinski and Suzanne Ierace have made this one of the school's awareness raising events. A virtual assembly will occur for students as well as many activities throughout the day.

R U OK? is a suicide prevention initiative in Australia reminding people to have meaningful conversations with loved ones, friends and colleagues to promote awareness about mental health, address social isolation and encourage Australians to reach out to those at risk in our community.

Students are invited to wear something yellow in promotion of R U OK? and bring a gold coin donation. Money raised will be forwarded to support Kick Start for Kids who provide food for programs in schools including ours.

Subject Counselling - SACE Course Confirmation Day

Students in Years 9, 10 and 11 are in the midst of subject selection processes for 2021. This week Year 10 and 11 students and parents attended subject selection and course confirmation meetings with home group teachers and subject counselling staff.

PAT Testing

Progressive Assessment Testing is taking place over the next three weeks. Students in Years 3 to 10 are taking progress tests in reading and maths to determine how they are travelling in their learning programs and what areas need further attention.

Staff Professional Learning Program

During the student free day on Monday 7th September staff were involved in a variety of collaborative learning activities. This was a common day for primary and secondary schools across the north eastern area. The day resulted in many teachers working in year levels and subject areas to continue to develop teaching practices by sharing work and learning with teachers from other schools as well as teachers within our school.

Glen Pearsall facilitated a webinar for primary teachers in schools across our partnership. Secondary teachers connected with other secondary teachers across the north eastern area in small groups using Microsoft Teams to share and critique task design and feedback strategies.

Later in the afternoon staff were involved in Work Health and Safety mandatory work.

New Build

In a matter of a fortnight, much activity has occurred in the north west corner of the school. In preparation for construction of new classrooms, old buildings have been demolished and the ground has been flattened.

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LOST ITEMS

We recognise it is inevitable that items will be misplaced by students. To assist in reuniting lost items with their owner we would like to highlight the importance of clear labelling with students full name and current class on all items.

Lost property will be located in a central collection point;

- Primary years; the corridor outside the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen
- Secondary years; under the stairwell in M building

Students are encouraged to take responsibility for their own belongings and if missing check appropriate collection areas throughout the school day. Parents seeking lost items should check the lost property before school (8:40am - 8:55am) or after school (3:05pm - 3:30pm) to claim items.

Unclaimed but labelled items will be returned to their rightful owners after each clean-up of the lost property. At the end of each term any unclaimed uniform items in good condition will be utilised by the school and all non-uniform items in good condition will be donated to a local charity.


Have you heard?...

Place your canteen lunch orders online (R-6)

Our canteen service has partnered with Flexischools to allow families of Primary years children (R-6) the option of placing lunch orders online at any time while easily monitoring your child's nutrition. Once registered you can start placing orders immediately and select from payment options - Visa, Mastercard, PayPal or direct deposit.



ATSI GARDEN MENTOR PROGRAM

This year the Aboriginal Education team commenced a Garden Mentor Program for the ATSI students at The Heights School. Amanda who runs the garden graciously gave our students two nice sized garden patches to work with and make their own. The program consists of small groups attending a one lesson block every fortnight. These sessions are run by the Aboriginal Secondary Education and Transition Officer and Aboriginal Education Teacher.

Our school was fortunate enough to receive a 30 plant grant from Tea Tree Gully Council this term. This allowed us to visit Provident Indigenous Plants in Salisbury to pick 30 Indigenous plants to populate our garden with.

The aim of the Garden Mentor Program is to have our ATSI students engaged in learning about the natural environment, seasons and how to care for gardens, positive food habits, practical skills from recycling, composting, budgeting as well as life skills and engagement. This is especially important for those who face barriers learning in the traditional classroom environment.

YEAR 9 VISUAL ART

This term my Year 9 Visual Art students have been inspired by a variety of techniques I applied to their learning. They began with a pencil drawing of a domestic pet, before replicating this in charcoal. From there, they moved on to Drypoint (a printmaking technique whereby you scratch the surface of a piece of Perspex. Ink is applied and the image is printed onto paper using an old-style printing press). Finally, they created a ceramic pot onto which they incorporated the same image. I was very impressed by my students' engagement in the subject and as you can see from these examples, their exceptional outcomes. As a result, their work has been entered in the Adelaide Fringe 2021 poster competition.

STAGE 1 CHEMISTRY NEWS - TITRATIONS

Recently in Stage I Chemistry, students conducted a titration. A titration is a technique where a solution of known concentration is used to determine the concentration of an unknown solution. Typically, the titrant (the known solution) is added from a burette to a known quantity of the analyte (the unknown solution) until the reaction is complete. Knowing the volume of titrant added allows the determination of the concentration of the unknown. Often, an indicator is used to usually signal the end of the reaction, the endpoint.
