Regular Attendance

The likelihood of success in learning is strongly linked to regular attendance and participation in educational programs.

We are striving to maintain high student attendance rates.

Last year our students' attendance rate was 88% which is below the 90 to 91% average where it has consistently been for the last five years.

With the onset of COVID-19 last year was a different year and we continue to monitor attendance figures this year.

The importance of attending school regularly cannot be overstated. Students should have very few days absent each year.

Many students achieve a 95% attendance rate or greater this means they are absent for 10 or less school days per year.

Unless there are exceptional circumstances the number of days absent per year should be very small, no more than a handful and certainly less than 10. If your child is absent from school please account for their absence.

Pick Up and Drop Off

You would have received a letter emailed from me about not driving into the school car parks for pick up and drop off purposes directly before and after school. I want to emphasise the importance of this request. These areas are not for this purpose, they have become too congested.

Instead use the pick up and drop off points around the boundaries of the school that have been outlined on a map and in an email.

Dr Shannon Walker read the book from the International Space Station.



PICK UP-DROP OFF POINTS AROUND THE SCHOOL

Re: Pick Up and Drop Off Points around the School

We have received an increase in feedback from families with safety concerns around cars in school car park areas. As a result of these concerns, I am writing to notify you that parents/caregivers are now not permitted to drive into school car parks for the purpose of dropping off/picking up students before and after school and during the school day.

Please note that families accessing the OSHC service are still permitted to access car parks when their child(ren) are booked in. Drivers with a disability parking permit may still access the main car park when needing to park and exit the car.

Despite signage and frequent request this is a practice that unfortunately has been increasing. The limited on site car parking has not been designed for this level of traffic and having children amongst this congestion of cars trying to get in and turn around and get out needs to cease.

A map is provided with this email with the intention of providing you alternatives. You'll see the school has a large boundary with accessible side streets that offer many offsite parking options.

The side roads such as Tresauget St, Isambard Crt, Roebling St, Metcalfe Ave, Telford Cres, Cockatoo Way, Kestrel Way, Cobby Drive, Hargrave St and Bellchambers Crt provide a multitude of offsite parking options and I imagine once you get into a routine you'll find these much less congested and safer for you to use.

These areas are indicated on the map by yellow footprints to pedestrian entrances. Walkway paths are highlighted in orange for walking access.

Please arrange your child to meet you at an arranged access point and if your child is too young then park your car at one of these offsite locations and walk to a pedestrian entrance to drop your child off or meet them at the end of school.

For the many families who are conscious of this congestion and have been talking with us about solutions, thank you for your patience.

Finally a big thank you to those people already cooperating with our signage and using offsite options. I look forward to everyone cooperating with this request in future.


There are no longer hard copies of the Entertainment Book. Digital membership is accessed by downloading the app and purchasing a 12 month membership at the following location:

STAGE 2 FOOD AND HOSPITALITY EXCURSION AND SOUP DRIVE



It gave us great pleasure again this year to help the Pathways Community Centre, located on Milne Road at Modbury, in providing fresh soup to their many clients. The focus of the task was to create nutritious soups for a community group while also considering food sustainability.

This year, not only did students make soup for the centre, they were also able visit the community centre and witness first-hand how they operate and serve the local community. Last year the centre served over 3600 individuals and families with fresh food hampers, that equates to roughly 150 food hampers a day. During the visit it was evident to students how crucial the role of volunteers are. At Pathways they have over 200 volunteers who support them process over 840,000 kilos of food which equates to 1.8 million meals.

In total, the students made 73 litres of heart-warming soups, ranging from traditional chicken and vegetable to a delicious vegan leek and potato soup. The soups were delivered fresh in microwave safe containers for easy transportation and distribution. This year to extend the task, students placed a QR code on their soup containers, which linked back to a blog that contained all the soup recipes.

The students should be immensely proud of their efforts in supporting an important and crucial community initiative. After the tour some students wanted to continue to help out and have committed to returning in the school holidays to volunteer.

YEAR 10 WORK EXPERIENCE

During Week 3 this term, the vast majority of our Year 10 students undertook work placements in a range of industries and locations across the metropolitan area. Their aims included experiencing a working environment and, in many cases, learning more about the career or industry that they had identified as part of their Personal Learning Plan studies. The feedback that PLP teachers received when they contacted their supervisors during the week was overwhelmingly positive. Many supervisors were thrilled with our students' commitment, energy, willingness to learn and engage with others.

Such was the positive impression they gave and the quality of the work they performed, quite a few students were offered a position working at that place. In more than one instance, the skills and knowledge they developed during their placement enabled them to successfully apply for positions with other businesses.

All students took advantage of the opportunity to develop their existing employability skills that they'd learned in different subjects at school, such as communication, teamwork and self-management as well as learning new skills, often specific to that occupation or industry, such as technology and problem solving.

Here are a few responses by students or employers

"The only unexpected thing was getting offered a job, I wanted one, but I did not think they were going to think I was good enough to offer me one. ... While working at 42nd Street I got a fair amount of training and new skills that I think can and will benefit me and my future. Some of the new skills I got was a lot more customer service experience, how to manage my time and stay on top of the quantities of things I was asked to do and a lot more skills. Two employability skills I learnt were customer service skills and being able to move quickly while holding multiple plates with and without food so I could move quickly while being able to multitask." "During the work placement, one of the most important things I learned was the importance of being a primary school teacher. They are essential for teaching students basics before they go to complete their higher education. Teaching students isn't an easy job, they need to encourage them to develop new skills and embed knowledge which will assist them in high school. With students that have learning issues, teaching them is a challenge. I personally experienced this during the placement." (Mukti Panchani 1006)

"Going on work placement has helped me improve my organisation and communication skills. I had to manage my time independently to make sure I was on time every day. I used my sticky notes app to keep track of everything. My communication skills improved as I spent many hours a day talking with people about what they do and how they feel about working in the council." (Jas Buttery SS06)

"Doing a work placement at a child care centre helped me a lot as I now know that I would love to work with children in some way or another. This placement also helped my confidence as it made me realise that I can do more than I thought and that I don't need to rely on others." (Caitlin Doolan 1003)

"The time of the year was really challenging because the farmers are between seasons. I enjoyed working with livestock." (Harrison Morrell 1004)

"Joss showed great signs of enthusiasm, never was disrespectful, even when given less encouraging jobs such as cleaning or tidying up. Picked up the skills quite easily and showed great teamwork skills. He also demonstrated great initiative when I wasn't around and would be great to have in the workforce." (Joss Justo's Supervisor)


"It clarified my future pathway and how I can get there." (Alicia Marchant-De-Smit 1004)
