#### **Did You Know?**

- There is direct correlation between attendance and achievement.
- Frequent absences make it difficult for teachers who have to continually re-teach information and skills.
- · Being half an hour late each day from reception to year 10 equals missing one year and one and a half terms of schooling.
- Patterns of attendance/absence are set up in the early years of schooling.
- · Being absent 5 days per term from reception to year 10 adds up to more than one year of missed schooling.
- Students who are frequently absent from school are over represented in the juvenile justice system.
- Poor attendance makes it difficult for students to form positive relationships with their peers.
- Students who are frequently absent from school are more likely to end up homeless.
- Research shows that students who are often absent from school are likely to earn less than their peers as adults.



### 906 SCIENCE LOT 14 EXCURSION

On Friday 10<sup>th</sup> September students from 906 Science were the first from The Heights School to visit Lot Fourteen on North Terrace and took part in a tour of the Australian Space Discovery Centre, complete with Mission Control, Careers Wall and Space Gallery Area.

We were able to experience and be inspired by staff who gave an insight into the careers and opportunities that await the next generation. We learnt that careers in space aren't all about being an astronaut, but include manufacturing, to engineering, space medicine, geology, Al and computing, with thousands of opportunities being created in this rapidlygrowing sector.

After an informative session where we were inspired to question links and similarities between marine biology and space exploration, students were then able to explore the latest innovations in space technologies and learnt about Australia's role in space exploration.









### YEAR 7 CAMP



#### Year 7 Murraylands Aquatics Camp 2021

On Monday 13 September, 704 and 703 went to the Murraylands Aquatics Centre for a three-day camping trip. Both classes stayed for three days and two nights total.

Once we had arrived at Murraylands Aquatic Centre after our 1.5 hour bus ride, we unloaded each other's baggage into one big heap. Unfortunately, it began to rain as both classes were getting organised. Students got changed into their bathers, then shortly met their instructors. Teachers and instructors explained all ground rules students had to follow whilst staying at the campsite.

Over the course of three days, students were provided with different food choices per meal. For breakfast on both mornings we were given the opportunity to choose between cereal with toast on Tuesday and Wednesday. On Wednesday, we had the addition of delicious pancakes to the menu. Lunch was fairly simple but filling. Bread rolls were served with a wide variety of fillings that the caterer had prepared beforehand. For dinner, students were given options of a variety of pastas, salads, dressings, and also baked potato with a wide range of drinks.

There were many different activities we could participate in during the camp. Seeing as there were many students, the teachers had split us into seven groups, each getting an instructor to follow. Most groups had different activity schedules. The activities consisted of knee boarding, water skiing, sailing, small boat handling, kayaking, canoeing, then lastly stand-up paddle boarding. Outside of the water activities, there were also a couple of memorable things we could do. On Monday night, after dinner, both classes went on a night walk, led by Mr Markou. There was a small bonfire where students were able to roast marshmallows on Monday and Tuesday evenings.

Even though it was quite warm during the day, it got very cold once it had become night-time. It was about 2-3 degrees by around midnight. Early in the mornings, the tents were covered in dew, as well as there being a large wave of fog drifting through the air.

On Wednesday morning, after breakfast, we packed all our belongings into our suitcases and bags, then went off to our last activities before we left the campsite. Once finished with activities, the other two classes arrived, signalling it was time for us to leave.

Year 7 camp was an amazing experience that everyone got to enjoy. Even though there were some activities some students did not attempt, it was still very entertaining to watch our classmates and friends have fun on the water.

Thank you to everyone involved in organising such a memorable camp. We won't be forgetting it anytime soon!

## YEAR 7 CAMP

#### Year 7 Camp 2021

On Wednesday, 15 September, the Year 7 students went on camp to Murraylands Aquatics Centre. The camp went for 3 days and 2 nights. The camp was split up because there were too many years 7s. This meant that 703 and 704 went together (from Monday to Wednesday) and 701 and 702 went together (from Wednesday to Friday).

It was around 8:20am when students arrived at the coach. Everyone was either stuffing their luggage underneath the coach, or sitting around talking about who was going to sit where. A little while later once everyone had arrived, we were required to split into our classes and take the roll call. We were told that it was going to be an incredibly cold night and to be prepared with suitable clothing.

We travelled by coach and put all of our luggage into the bottom of the coach. We were finally allowed to pick our seats on the coach after all the luggage was loaded. Luckily both 701 and 702 were able to fit on one bus, which made the ride a lot easier.

Students were bursting with excitement the whole time. The bus luckily had a small TV and was playing a documentary about the safety of younger kids around water for the whole two hours! The bus ride took around 2 hours, but it didn't feel too long. When we arrived, we went into our tents with our chosen partner so we could take all our luggage out and lay out our sleeping bags.

Before anyone could unpack, we were required to show the teachers all the foods and drinks we had brought with us. This was because many people had brought too much, and the teachers did not want us to have a sugar rush and have a feast in the middle of the night.

After giving us a whole lecture about what sugar can do to you, we were finally allowed to pick our tent. Everyone was running around trying to pick the best ones for them and their partners. A few moments later we brought all our luggage in and unpacked.

After sorting out our tents we were led out into an area with benches. There, we got told about our routine of where we had to wait and what we had to do for the next 2 days. We all got split up into groups of 5 and were told what activities we had awaiting us.

After eating our recess and lunch we completed our first activity. Everyone was split up into 6 different groups. We then met our instructor and they led us into the shed. There was a Velcro wall filled with everyone's names. We eventually found our names and stuck them to our PFD life jackets so that we could find them a lot easier for the next few days.

At around 12:30pm the main instructor talked about the rules and all the sun safe equipment we were required to wear to keep safe as we would be in the sun a lot for the next three days. The activities we did throughout the 3 days were knee boarding, water skiing, canoeing, sailing the catamarans, kayaking, stand up paddle boarding, and small boat handling. Each group also had an instructor to teach us how to do each activity.

Wednesday night was the coldest. It was 4 degrees Celsius, with some students practically freezing while sleeping. During the night some particles of ice formed on everyone's tents, but when we woke up it had already dissolved into water. Waking up was a real struggle. Not only was it cold but some back people's backs were sore due to the really hard ground.

Thursday night was surprisingly a pretty good night as it was a much warmer 12 degrees Celsius. Students knew that it was going to be cold but not as cold as the night before. Still, they wore a lot more clothes so they didn't risk freezing again!

Year 7 camp was really fun, and we enjoyed every part of it. For many students it was their first aquatics experience on the river. Everyone had a great time and had a go at every activity.

From all fun we all had, to the delicious food we ate, this was a very enjoyable experience. We would like to thank all the instructors, teachers and SSOs for everything they have done to organise and run the Year 7 camp.



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## FOOD TECHNOLOGY AND HOSPITALITY

#### Stage I and 2 Food and Hospitality Sustainable Food Options

This term both Stage I and Stage 2 Food and Hospitality classes have been studying food sustainability and exploring how food and hospitality businesses can reduce food waste and produce food in a more environmentally friendly manner.

Stage I classes focused on food wastage in food and hospitality. Bread was highlighted as a major problem. According to the founder of food rescue charity Oz Harvest, bread represents a significant slice of food wastage — the economic cost of which has been estimated at more than \$20 billion a year. "Bread is definitely one of the most wasted foods in Australia, and it's a global phenomenon," Ronni Kahn said.

To address this problem, students made bread cup case quiches and bread and butter pudding, an easy solution for that excess, not so fresh bread that usually gets thrown out. Here is the recipe you can try at home.

#### BREAD CUP QUICHES - MAKES 3 INGREDIENTS

- 3 slices bread, crusts cut off
- 20g butter, softened
- I egg
- 1/4 cup cream/Milk/Sour cream
- I Tablespoon grated Cheese
- 1/4 Cup Filling
- I Tablespoon grated parmesan
- Sea salt and cracked black pepper, to taste

#### <u>METHOD</u>

1. Preheat oven to 160°C. Using a rolling pin, roll out each slice of bread until it's very thin. Lightly spread one side of each slice with the butter. Use the bread slices, buttered-side down, to line the holes of a ½-cup-capacity muffin tins, folding and pressing them in to fit. Bake for 15 minutes or until golden. Wearing oven gloves, carefully remove the tins from the oven.

2. Break the egg into a large jug. Add the remaining ingredients, mix to combine, using a fork. Pour into the bread cases and sprinkle the parmesan.

**3.** Bake for 15–20 minutes or until just set. Wearing oven gloves, remove the trays from the oven and allow to cool a little.

Stage 2 students researched the dramatic rise of plant- based foods that are being sold in supermarkets and how these products are being marketed. Not only did students create some tasty dishes, but they also created their own packaging that would appeal to consumers wanting to try plant-based foods. Dishes included, cauliflower-based pizza, chickpea curry, vegetarian samosa and a fresh vegan stir fry with beetroot noodles.

#### GNOCCHI WITH NAPOLITANA SAUCE - Serves 2

#### GNOCCHI INGREDIENTS

- 2 large potatoes
- I egg yolk
- 1/4 Cup flour

#### **METHOD**

I. Peel and chop potatoes into large chunks, place in a medium saucepan of boiling water. Reduce to simmer and cook until soft.





- 2. Drain potato well and mash.
- 3. Add flour and beaten egg, mix well.
- **4.** Turn mixture onto a lightly floured bench and knead for 2 minutes.

5. Roll into a sausage shape and cut into 2-centimetre lengths. Roll into balls and marl one side with prongs of a fork.

6. Bring a medium saucepan of water to the boil. Place Gnocchi in boiling water until it floats to the top.

7. Drain immediately.

## NAPOLITANA SAUCE

- 2 tsp olive oil
- 1/2 onion, finely diced
- I garlic clove, finely chopped
- $\frac{1}{2}$  can diced tomatoes
- I Tablespoon tomato paste
- ¼ cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon chilli flakes/mixed herbs
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- Salt and pepper to taste

#### <u>METHOD</u>

I. Heat the oil in a pan, cook onion, and garlic for a couple of minutes.

2. Stir in tomatoes, tomato paste, water, chilli and sugar. Season with salt and pepper and simmer, covered, stirring occasionally, about 10 minutes.


