Strengthening School Community Relationships and the School Complaint Process

Good relationships within the school community give students a greater chance of success. There will be times when people have concerns about what happens at school. When this happens, we would like to encourage an open dialogue with you. To hear your concerns and work out how to address them, we have an established complaint process.

Your child's teacher is usually your first point of call. If the matter involves more than just one teacher, you should be talking with the Year Level Mentor who is overseeing the year level that your child is in. Often this person is not immediately available but they will return your call or make an appointment with you.

In the event of a concern please use the following guidelines:

Steps:

- I. Please report to the Front Office.
- 2. Arrange a time to speak to the relevant teacher/s about the problem.

- 3. Please do not enter school classrooms or offices about a complaint without prior arrangement.
- 4. Let the teacher know what you consider to be the issue.
- 5. Allow a reasonable time for the issue to be addressed.
- 6. If the issue is not addressed, please arrange a time to speak with your child's Year Level Mentor.

If the matter has not been addressed to your satisfaction, please contact the Principal's Assistant who will record your call and assist you with the school's complaint process. The Principal's Assistant is the first point of contact and will refer the matter to the appropriate Senior Leader, Deputy Principal or Principal as required.

- If the matter is still unresolved after following the school's complaint process, you may choose to discuss the issue with the Education Complaint Unit on 1800 677 435.
- Parents with a concern about School Policy should: I. Arrange a meeting time with the Principal to discuss your concern.
- 2. Allow a reasonable time frame for the issue to be addressed.
- 3. If the matter is still unresolved, you may choose to discuss the issue with the Education Complaint Unit on 1800 677 435.

Principles:

- Everyone should be treated with respect.
- Meetings to discuss complaints will be suspended if any person behaves in an insulting or offensive manner.

ATTENDANCE: EVERY DAY COUNTS

Regular attendance at school lays the foundation for children's wellbeing and learning outcomes. The Department for Education regards any student who is absent from school for:

- 5-9 days per term, as habitual non-attendance.
- 10 or more days per term, as chronic non-attendance.

The table below outlines the potential impact of ongoing absences for your child:

In some cases, absences from school are unavoidable due to COVID, health problems or other circumstances. However, it is well documented that chronic absenteeism can have a significant impact on a child's educational outcomes and future success.

It has been great seeing students with their recording sheets. Students are to read and record 12 books with primary students needing to choose at least 8 books from the PRC list. The PRC



Deacan has shown great commitment to his studies obtaining very good grades. The Karnkanthi scholarship will entitle Deacan to funding and tutoring outside of school and inclusion into programs run by the university, with hopefully an outcome of a university pathway.

Learning Outcome

This session offered jointly by Uncle Mickey Kumatpi O'Brien, and the Migration Museum Enhances the awareness and understanding of South Australian history up to and including the Apology to the Stolen Generations in 2008 and the Uluru Statement From The Heart in 2017.

The Migration Museum opened in 1986, the first museum in the world to take migration and settlement as its subject. The museum works closely with communities to develop and deliver engaging exhibitions, education and public programs.

The Migration Museum tells stories of South Australians and celebrates cultural diversity. The Migration Museum is a museum of the History Trust of South Australia.



The Impact program examines key issues in Aboriginal and colonial history, the dispossession of Aboriginal people and its legacy of racism. Impact is a powerful and challenging history session that exposes the other side of South Australia's history and encourages participants to view historical events inclusive of Aboriginal Peoples experiences. The program is delivered as a multi-media presentation, supported by a range of sources including archival photographs, documents, Aboriginal voices and video footage.

Working together with Uncle Mickey O'Brien, this session will explore the impact of colonization with a focus on including personal stories and reflections. The program's focus on the history of the colonisation of South Australia and its continuing impact complements and supports cultural awareness/ competency/ capability training programs.
