PUBLIC EDUCATION STUDENT FORUMS

On Tuesday 8th November students from Year 10 and Year 5 attended the Public Education Student Forum Summit. The event was a state wide conversation about the purpose of public education and to hear from students about what they currently value and what they would like in the future. Students discussed topics such as student wellbeing, student agency, the curriculum and preparing for life after school. During the forum students had the opportunity to hear presentations, share their thinking with others, work in breakout sessions to look at state wide data and also consider ways to collect feedback from their peers at school. The collective feedback from the students will feed into the wider consultation in 2023.

The day began with a session to set the scene for students to speak up and share their own and others' views. They explored education news of innovations around the world and considered future possibilities in South Australian public schools. They spent time meeting fellow students to share ideas and opinions and heard from the Chief Executive, Professor Martin Westwell.

The middle session allowed students to break into smaller groups to explore South Australian data to look at patterns, celebrate success and help identify the next steps as an education system.

In the final session of the day students were shared educational research from across the world to consider how this impacts South Australia. Students discussed and shared possibilities of how to move forward in these areas. At the end of the day, the Minister for Education, Blair Boyer concluded the program and shared the next steps for continuing the discussion back in schools and in 2023.

Hearing the speakers share their plans for the future of public education and the importance of events like the summit was very insightful and I appreciated their transparency, particularly when Minister, Blair Boyer, acknowledged how the Department of Education has faith in its strengths and planned forward for success. I also enjoyed how we students were able to 'get into the zone' through various activities that helped ease any anxious feelings.

I feel that the things we said and the things we shared were valued and would be taken into consideration by the adults in the room which instilled me with a sense of confidence and hope for a better future. The sincerity coming from the speakers and the encouraging collaboration efforts with other students proved for an uplifting and inspirational experience, which I personally enjoyed.

YEAR 8 STEM DAY OUT TO UNI SA

On Wednesday 16th November 2022, three Year 8 Science classes (803, 804 and 805) attended a STEM focused excursion to University of South Australia. A special program of fun, engaging STEM activities for middle school students, STEM Day Out incorporated a series of three STEM workshops focussing on the science of flight, puzzling mathematics, and the engineering design process.

Students explored the science of air – how it moves, how strong it is, and some of the amazing ways it behaves. They applied this and discovered what this has to do with planes while making your own plane wing.

Students discovered why puzzles are fundamental to mathematical thinking and explored how mathematical thinking links to problem solving.

Students designed and constructed a paper tower within set parameters using limited materials while developing their collaborative working, communication and time management skills.

UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA STEM INNOVATION EXPERIENCE NATIONAL FINAL

This November, The Heights School students took part in the STEM Innovation Experience (STEMIE) National Final, where 25 schools from around Australia (South Australia, Victoria, Canberra, and Queensland), totalling more than 300 students competed on projects related to the management of mineral resources using science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. In October this year, The Heights School won the Regional Final allowing them to compete in the National Final.

Following our school's success at the STEMIE Regional Final, six Year 10 Ignite students attended the first ever National Final at the University of South Australia's Magill campus on the 10th of November with The Heights School students competing against 5 schools from South Australia and Queensland.

The final continued with the mineral resources theme and was designed similar to an Escape Room, where students were required to complete a challenge before receiving the next clue to move onto the next challenge. All clues led to the final challenge which was to determine the location of the lost gold. Throughout the day students built a moving vehicle, a computer game, completed an elemental chemistry challenge and designed a scaled map of the escape room. All challenges were timed and final points were accumulated by the number of correct answers and the fastest time recorded.

The Heights School students submitted all correct solutions to the challenges however were not the fastest school, with only 5 minutes separating us and the leading school. At the final tally, The Heights School placed nationally in the top 6 schools.

We are so proud of the students throughout this year as they demonstrated exemplary skills in problem solving, communication and collaboration.

CLASS 104 REMEMBRANCE DAY

Leading up to Remembrance Day, Class 104 and Miss McMahon read the book 'Lest We Forget' written by Kerry Brown and illustrated by Isobel Knowles and Benjamin Portas.

This book is about a young boy who visits his grandfather. Together they share stories about the important days in their lives. Days they

want to remember, and days they want to forget.

As the young boy shares his memorable moments - his first day at school, the birth of his younger sister, and a walk to school in the sun with a heavy backpack - the illustrations reflect similar experiences for his grandfather - leaving for war wearing his new uniform, holding a photo of his newborn child, and trekking through the jungle with wounded men on stretchers.

104 discussed the sacrifices the brave men and women made to ensure the freedom we all have each day. Additionally, our school's values of Respect, Resilience and Responsibility which tie in with the sacrifices each soldier made and continues to make.

104 discussed how Australia and other countries of the Commonwealth, recognise the red poppy as the commemorative flower of remembrance. The flower reminds us of those who lost their lives or suffered in wars, conflicts and peacekeeping operations. It's a tradition that began in the early 1900s, after World War I.

Class 104 creatively made their own red poppy badges using red felt, black pom poms, glue and safety pins. Once complete students then went on to make felt soldier puzzles, 11th hour clocks and poppy fields. We accompanied our work with the Australian Flag.

DÍA DE LOS MUERTOS (THE DAY OF THE DEAD)

Día de los Muertos, also known as The Day of the Dead, is a festival celebrated in Mexico and Central America on the 1st and 2nd of November. It is believed to be the day when souls travel to the living world to reunite with their family and friends. The first day is to commemorate the children who have died while the second is for the adults. Día de los Muertos is mostly celebrated at homes and cemeteries in Mexico and its bordering countries.

The celebratory traditions are different depending on the location, however the common celebrations involve decorating altars and graves to honour those who have died. The altars and graves are adorned with Ofrendas (offerings) which include objects such as photos of those who have passed away and candles that are believed to light the path for the returning spirits. Food and water such as Calaveras (sugar skulls) and Pan de Muerto (bread of the dead) are also offered, as they may be tired after the long journey to Earth. Moreover, Día de los Muertos is celebrated with dancing, fun activities, eating, drinking, and most importantly, spending quality time with family. During this celebration, people wear festive makeup to represent the dead while singing and dancing at joyous parades. Día de los Muertos is an exciting celebration that mainly

revolves around culture and spiritual aspects of life after death, reminding us that people are remembered and cherished even after they're gone.

While our Spanish classes were eagerly learning about Día de los Muertos, we participated in several educational activities. These activities included watching various short films, making and decorating Calaveras (sugar skulls), and completing our, "I used to think, I now think," thinking routine to show how our understanding of the festival changed through participating in these learning activities. The other classes also completed crafts such as, creating 'Papel Picado' (traditional Mexican decorative craft) and paper marigolds, as well as watching the animated film *Coco*. It was interesting to dive into the diversity of culture and have the opportunity to investigate how Spanish-speaking countries view death in comparison to Australia. The activities we undertook surrounding this topic allowed us to have fun and be creative whilst still studying about this valuable tradition.
