EDUCATION RESEARCH AND INNOVATION



"We are more" campaign

Last week saw the launch of the SACE Board's "We are more" campaign.

This campaign reflects the fact that key research and policy directions from around the world support the need to recognise a broader and deeper range of young people's skills and capabilities than those reflected solely by their ATAR.

Whilst families and educators are highly aware of the personal qualities and capabilities of students, these dimensions of students are yet to be recognised formally by assessment authorities.

Assessments, across much of the world, still focus only on academic achievement even though it is now recognised that success for young people leaving school in the 2020s and beyond is influenced by a broader set of qualities than academic achievement alone.

For some years now, educators have moved towards an understanding that 'the world cares about what students can do with what they know, rather than simply what they know'. This means that alongside the learning of content of curriculum, we recognise the need to enable students to develop and demonstrate a range of capabilities and dispositions such as:

- collaboration
- asking good questions rather than simply responding to the questions of others
- identifying different perspectives
- · empathising with others
- · making ethical decisions

The work, currently being undertaken by the SACE Board is innovative and complex. As such it will develop in stages over the next few years. At The Heights School we are engaging in relevant professional learning and are beginning to introduce changes that will support our students to make the most of the SACE opportunity to accredit their capabilities, once this opportunity is available.

Each term, in our newsletter, we'll highlight an initiative at The Heights School that demonstrates our commitment to designing learning opportunities that empower our students to both develop and demonstrate capabilities that will support their success both in school and beyond. Be sure to look out for this feature in our next newsletter, when we will showcase our learning partnership with Fleurieu Milk. LOST PROPERTY

We recognise it is inevitable that items will be misplaced by students. To assist in reuniting lost items with their owner we would like to highlight the importance of clear labelling with students full name and current class on all items.

Primary Years

Lost property for Primary Years will be located in a central collection point; the corridor outside the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen.

Students are encouraged to take responsibility for their own belongings and if missing check appropriate collection area throughout the school day. Primary Years parents seeking lost items should check the lost property before school ($8:40 \, \text{am} - 8:55 \, \text{am}$) or after school ($3.05 \, \text{pm} - 3.30 \, \text{pm}$) to claim items.

Secondary Years

Lost property for Secondary Years is at the Front Office, please enquire with front desk staff. We only have a small number of unlabelled jackets/windcheaters. Students are encouraged to also check for lost items in the area of the school that they have lost them.

Name Labelled Items

If an item is labelled with a student's name it will be returned to their rightful owner via the class or home group teacher.

Unlabelled Items

At the end of each term any unclaimed uniform items in good condition will be utilised by the school and all non-uniform items in good condition will be donated to a local charity.

Iron-On Labels Available at the Uniform Shop

We would like to remind families that iron on name labels are available to purchase at the uniform shop for \$1.00ea. There is no minimum order on labels and we would like to encourage families to make sure that items display the student name to ensure it can be returned.

LETTER FOR FAMILIES - NCCD

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with a Disability (NCCD)

Dear Parents / Caregivers



Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines (2019)*.

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- · year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- · level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- · formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- · consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. TTG YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM



Week 9 Wednesday - DAMPER DAY


Primary classes involved in the Kitchen Garden Program will cook and eat traditional damper, with a variety of bush jams and chutney.






LION ARTWORK BY YEAR 2 CLASS 203

SECONDARY YEARS (7 - 12) - MOBILE PHONE INFORMATION FOR TERM 3

From the first day of Term 3, The Heights School will join all Public High Schools across South Australia in the introduction of the 'Phones OFF while School's ON' policy.

This week families have received information about The Heights School Mobile Phone Policy implementation. If you haven't yet had a chance to read that information, we encourage you to check it out, but here's a brief summary in the meantime:



- On the first day of Term 3, each student in Years 7-12 will receive one Yondr pouch in which they will be required to store their phone during school hours.
- When students enter the school grounds, they will turn their phone
 OFF and lock it AWAY in their Yondr pouch.
- On Wednesday and Thursday in Week 10, students will attend an assembly about the new Mobile Phone Policy and use of the Yondr pouch.
- The information shared with families this week explains in detail the processes and expectations about our Mobile Phone Policy.

We are committed to supporting students of The Heights School to successfully meet the expectations of this state-wide mobile phone strategy. We firmly believe that having phones 'OFF and AWAY' during the school day will bring significant advantages for learning and wellbeing. We also acknowledge that, during the initial stages of this policy, some students will feel challenged by the need to be phone free for the day, especially during recess and lunch times. To address this, teachers and leaders have been working with our SRC to develop initiatives that will support all students to be successful in making the change to having phone free days.

SUCCESSFUL CO2 DRAGSTER PROGRAM AT THE HEIGHTS SCHOOL

On the 31st May students successfully staged The Heights School CO2 dragster competition. The logistics of staging the event was a challenge itself as the 25m track and timing equipment was gratefully loaned from Paralowie School and set up in the school gym. As the racing progressed through the day, many teachers brought their classes to watch and the enthusiasm displayed by students was overwhelming to say the least. At one stage, there were over 200 students present, eagerly watching the dragsters speeding down the track, enshrined with accurate, enthusiastic commentary from the Year 9 students and loud music creating a 'real-world' atmosphere.

During participation in the Year 9 CO2 dragster program at THS, students learn about: researching the three principles of design including mass, friction and drag; sketching techniques; designing; safety in the workshop; manufacturing; testing; evaluating; associated technical language; interpreting CAD models and working drawings; workshop manufacturing tools and equipment; assembly processes and procedures; digital folios; managing logistics of and running a competition.

So, what are CO2 Cars?

CO2 dragsters are miniature racing cars, less than 300mm long and mainly constructed from balsa wood, that students: design; build, test; modify; and eventually race. Propelled by CO2, two cars are raced at once down a 20m track and a timer records the speed (averaging 80kph!) for each lane. As they follow the design and build process, students learn about aerodynamics and ways to make their dragsters go faster.

There were 2 competitions run on the day with over 40 entries.

THE GREAT DEBATE - YEAR 9 ENGLISH

Students in Year 9 English worked hard this term to prepare, rehearse and deliver debates in the form of a mock courtroom trial. Students were given a role on an affirmative or negative team and then argued the case of either "The Moon Landing is a Hoax" or Lindy Chamberlain and "The Dingo Trial". Students took on real world personas such as lawyers, scientists, experts and witnesses and then devised a debate from their imagined perspective, supported with evidence.

Students worked hard to prepare convincing arguments and craft thoughtful rebuttals to their opposing contestants. It was a great exercise in collaboration, with a dose of healthy competition. YEAR 12 PHYSICS EXCURSION

On the I4th June, the Year I2 Physics Class attended Uni SA Mawson Lakes campus to participate in a Practical. We had the privilege of being supported by Nathaneal Scherer, Education Outreach Officer: STEM at Uni SA who supported the students as they completed what will be one of their final summative practical reports. The opportunity allowed students to access information, knowledge and equipment we don't have access to at the Heights.

Background: Electrons have a proportionally high charge when compared to their mass, meaning their charge-to mass ratio is high. As such, they are able to be readily deflected and/or focussed by electric and magnetic fields. This enables beams of electrons to be used in a wide range of applications, such as 'writing' at very high rates on the screen of a cathode ray oscilloscope, television or computer, or to be focussed onto a target, such as in electron microscopes or x-ray units.

The objective was to use a Teltron Tube to investigate the behaviour of charged particles under the influence of electric and magnetic field enabling students to calculate the charge-to-mass ratio (e/m) of electrons.

Students were also given the opportunity to work through a second practical on the Hall Effect. The Hall effect occurs when an electric current flows through a conductor in a magnetic field, a measurable voltage occurs between the sides of the conductor. This is known as a Hall Voltage, and is a result of the influence of the magnetic field on the charges carrying the current.


