



NATIONAL SIMULTANEOUS STORYTIME 2025

On Wednesday, 21 May students across the Primary Years took part in the annual National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS). This event involves millions of children across Australia participating in joint reading and storytelling, with a focus book chosen by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA).

This year's book was *The Truck Cat*, written by Deborah Frenkel, illustrated by Danny Snell; a story about cats and humans, immigration and identity, and homes lost and found.

Paige of 204 said: I think it was a good book; it shows us that we should not be afraid of our fears, and we should keep learning other languages, not just English, so that we can understand other people even if we don't know their culture.

Hamdan of 204 said: I liked that it showed that a lot of cats live in one place but the truck cat lives in more places than one – but at the end, the truck cat becomes a one-place cat. It made me feel that you shouldn't ignore people when they talk to you because it can be important to listen to other peoples' stories.

Students in 403 also enjoyed NSS activities with the Preschool, sharing The Truck Cat and enjoying a Truck Cat-themed treasure hunt.

We read the book The Truck Cat with our buddies. My favourite part was when Yacoub and Mari paired up with Tinka. - Freya

We did a scavenger hunt with the Preschool students to find Tinka. I liked that we got to work with our buddies. - Emelia

We also did some colouring in and taught the preschoolers how to colour inside the lines. - Kavish
















ARTS AND HASS COLLABORATION

In Term I, Petra Dolezalova and I discussed ways that students might be able to take an artistic approach to the Industrial Revolution topic they were studying at the time in HASS. I outlined the aspects of the topic the students would be studying and Petra identified ways that they could learn more about the period and demonstrate their understandings of those artistic perspectives.

Petra created a booklet that enabled students to study the theory of the Romanticism and Impressionism Movements, including some of the prominent artists of the time. Students spent one lesson each week on the theory.

Then students selected an image connected with the Industrial Revolution on which they could base a painting.

Meanwhile, students in various HASS classes were studying the causes, nature and effects of the Industrial Revolution. They developed their analytical, research and persuasive writing skills to produce three tasks.

The work the students produced across both disciplines demonstrated a wide variety of talents, perspectives and interpretations through different formats.

In HASS, students created models, essays, multi-model presentations and sources analysis responses.

Petra and I were so impressed with the range and quality of the work our students produced that we wanted to showcase them to the wider school community. We created a mini-exhibition in the Senior study area in M block.

By creating this exhibition and publicising our work, we hope this may inspire other teachers to look for co-curricular collaboration opportunities and provide students with a range of insights and perspectives to the topics they study across their subjects.

Petra and I would like to thank and congratulate students in her Arts class on seizing this opportunity to demonstrate their skills and knowledge in different contexts.

YEAR 11 CLINICAL BIOLOGY EXCURSION

On May 13, 15 and 21, Year 11 Biology students engaged in a series of interactive sessions focusing on human physiology and clinical skills. They explored the structure and function of red blood cells, understanding their role in oxygen transport and conditions like anaemia and sickle cell disease. Using blood pressure monitors and oximeters, students collected personal health data, measuring blood oxygen levels during various activities such as exercise and breath-holding. They also practiced hand hygiene techniques, emphasising

their importance in medical settings. In a simulated emergency scenario, students listened to a triple zero call, extracted pertinent information, and used vital signs from a training manikin to diagnose potential medical issues. These sessions provided students with a comprehensive understanding of human physiology and clinical practices, bridging classroom learning with real-world applications.

YEAR 10 PHOTOGRAPHY EXCURSION TO THE ADELAIDE ZOO

Photography students had a chance to apply the knowledge and skills they have learnt this semester on a field trip to the Adelaide Zoo on Thursday (29th May). The weather was perfect and the day was a great success.

In addition to learning how to use the cameras on manual and adjusting aperture and shutter speed, according the conditions, students have studied compositional rules and depth of field, and were able to apply this in a practical way. I look forward to the students' turn treading the boards in their production of *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* to be performed next term on Thursday, I4 August.




