PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

On behalf of The Heights School Principal Meg Fay, I am delighted to share some recent good news about a number of different events at our school, many of which are described in more detail in this edition of our school newsletter.

Our Year 12 class of 2025 recently celebrated their Year 12 Formal at Sfera's. This school event is well attended by students and staff, and very noticeably strongly supported by parents and families. The students enjoyed a fabulous formal event and I would like to thank the staff and

students involved in supporting this event to be so successful. Parent engagement with the pre-formal gathering provided a lovely opportunity to reflect on the learning and growth of our Year 12 students over their years at The Heights, and we wish our Year 12 students all the best as they head into their final full-term of Year 12 studies in Term 3.

At the end of this term, Semester I reports will be available for students and families to access via Daymap. These reports provide useful feedback about each learner's achievement and progress during Semester I and can be used to support conversations with your child or young person about their progress and developing areas of interest. We know there will be much to celebrate in these results, and also some valuable moments of reflection for some students to think about what they can proactively do in Semester 2 to reach their learning goals. The promotion of strategies to support active learning and student engagement is an ongoing focus for The Heights School; over coming months you will hear more about how metacognition and metacognitive strategies are being explicitly taught and modelled at our school to help strengthen effective learner engagement.

Other recent school events include Year II exams and Year I0 work experience. It is immensely valuable for our Year I0 students to experience a week in a real-world work environment, at a point in their schooling where any reflections they have about the experience can be responded to effectively. For some Year I0 students, their work experience week will support them to make more informed choices during the upcoming course counselling process that will occur mid-Term 3 to ensure they are choosing SACE subjects that best support their intended career pathway. For our Year II students, active participation in their mid-year exams help to prepare them for Stage 2 examinations and reinforce the need for good study habits to support long-term recall and deep understanding of their subjects. We encourage all secondary students to also use the upcoming Careers Expo at The Heights School to make informed choices about their future.

Before the term ends, I would also like to welcome our brand-new Reception students who will join us mid-year! We can't wait to meet you and welcome you into our Heights learning community.

We are also looking forward to the formal completion of The Heights Technical College, and to the completion of building works within The Heights School that have been unfortunately paused for some time. We have been aware of some concerns about the condition of the building site on the corner of Brunel Drive and Augustus Street; a new building company has been appointed to complete these works and this should commence very soon.



Please remember that Term 3 will commence on Tuesday, 22 July. The first day of term is a student-free day where all staff will be engaged in professional learning and development.



PRIMARY YEARS - LOST ITEMS
















INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PLAY

Through play, children build their imagination, resilience, problem-solving skills, friendships and confidence. Whether it's running around outside, creating with blocks, playing make-believe, or exploring new ideas through games, children learn through play.

















YEAR 8 DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

Assessment Task: Year 8 Bug Hotel Project


Students were given a sustainable design challenge of researching, designing, constructing and evaluating their own Bug Hotel made from recycled timbers, plywood, acrylic and other textiles. Each were required to complete segments of a design folio as part of this 7-week

task whilst learning appropriate technical terms within a range of technologies and graphical representation techniques including thumbnail sketching leading to Orthographic drawings, CAD Inventor modelling, Working Drawings with Australian Standards and Illustrator to Trotec Laser cutting and engraving. They applied project management skills to document and use project plans to manage production processes. Independently and within a group environment, students completed safety tests that enabled them to use a range of machines, tools and equipment, therefore, safely producing effective designed solutions for the intended purpose. The vast range of quality finishes were outstanding and a credit to each participating student.














YEAR 9 SPANISH EXCURSION: A CULTURAL ADVENTURE IN ADELAIDE

On Thursday 5 June the senior Spanish classes were involved in an excursion to Adelaide's CBD. This group included two classes of Year 9 students, and the SACE Stage I & 2 Spanish classes. The purpose of this excursion was to immerse students in authentic Hispanic experiences.

Our first destination was the Palace Nova Eastend Cinema where we participated in Adelaide's 'Spanish Film Festival'. After visiting the confectionery stand, staff and students settled into their seats in a private cinema to watch 'Raíz' or 'Through Rocks and Clouds'. The film was told through the eyes of eight-year-old Feliciano who spends his days looking after alpacas in a remote region of the Andes. His community and the region's delicate ecosystem are in jeopardy, due to contamination of the pastures and pressure from a mining company. As Feliciano goes about his daily life, the village residents decide to take their fate into their own hands, organising themselves to withstand pressure from the mining company to sell their land.

After the film, the classes split up to complete various cultural activities. The Year 9s were given the opportunity explore the Central Markets and discover the businesses / products related to Hispanic & Latino cultures. This experience allowed students the opportunity to reflect on the prevalence and importance of multiculturalism in Adelaide.



The Stage 2 class were not far away as they dined at 'Cumbia: The Home of South American Tapas'. The team at 'Cumbia' were all very friendly and extremely knowledgeable on South American cuisine. Staff and students were well looked after and had the opportunity to sample five different dishes: empanadas, coxinha, patatas bravas, paella and churros.

Meanwhile, the Stage I Spanish class spent the afternoon sampling Mexican cuisine at Zambreros before taking a tour of the Art Gallery in Spanish. This gave students the opportunity to discuss their opinions on art, descriptions, fabrics and materials, further developing their skills from the Fashion topic studied earlier in the semester.

This excursion would not have been possible without the support of the entire Spanish Team. Thank you to Oscar Asbanu, Simone Brock and Flor Rangel for giving up their time to help supervise. A special thank you also goes to Alison McNeil for assisting with supervision.

YEAR 9 SPANISH - MASTERCHEF MYSTERY DISH

The Year 9 Spanish classes have been learning about food and its importance to Spanish and Latinx culture. They recently completed a Text Analysis assessment in which they had to read contextual information about, translate the recipe for, and answer questions relating to Patatas Bravas. Students learnt that this recipe first emerged in Madrid in 1950, however, there is some controversy surrounding the dish as the original recipe is not often served anymore.

Students were given the opportunity to make an authentic version of Patatas Bravas to develop their appreciation its cultural importance. This unique occasion also allowed students the opportunity to try an authentic Hispanic dish.

This would not have been possible without the support from the Technologies Team. Thank you to Mr Davis for scheduling our use of these facilities, and thank you to Mr Utting and Ms Brown for assisting with supervision of the Year 9s whilst they completed their cooking. Students saw value in this task and greatly appreciated the cross-curriculum experience.

















YEAR 10 DEBATING TEAM




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WINTER MUSIC RECITAL NIGHT 2025





All students displayed each of our school values throughout the day and it was pleasing to see the team work demonstrated during each game.


