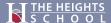












BOOK WEEK PARADE AND ASSEMBLY

Congratulations to all our award recipients and thank you to the band, led by Mr Roberts.













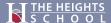












SUBJECT SELECTIONS AND COURSE CONFIRMATION

YEAR 11 VISUAL ARTS EXCURSION


On Monday 11th August, Year 11 Visual Art students visited the Art Gallery of SA.

Students first engaged in 'The Studio', making work in the style of Sue Kneebone, a contemporary Australian artist whose work invites us to think about social and environmental issues that impact the world around us. Kneebone uses assemblage and montage to make connections between memory, history and place. This connected well with the exhibition with her use of historical portraits and flora and fauna, showing how European settlers introduced species that have harmed our Australian environment.

Following this, we viewed 'Dangerously Modern', an exhibition of the work of fifty trailblazing Australian women artists who travelled to Europe during 1890-1940 to learn Art the European way, bringing their new ideas back to Australia in a time of rapid social and cultural change. This risky, adventurous spirit allowed them the opportunity to experience the world in a way that few single women of the day had. It was an eye opener, and inspirational to many of our students.

YEAR 12 HEALTH AND WELLBEING PARTY PROGRAM EXCURSION

Year 12 Health and Wellbeing Students Attend PARTY Program at Lyell McEwin Hospital

In Week 2 of this term, our Year 12 Health and Wellbeing students had the opportunity to take part in the Prevent Alcohol and Risk-Related Trauma in Youth (PARTY) Program at Lyell McEwin Hospital.

The PARTY Program is an interactive, hospital-based injury prevention initiative that gives students a confronting but valuable insight into the real-life consequences of risk-taking behaviours, including those involving alcohol, drugs, and unsafe driving.

Throughout the day, students met with a variety of health professionals including paramedics, emergency department nurses, doctors, and rehabilitation therapists. They participated in realistic scenarios and case studies based on actual patients, followed the journey of trauma patients from the scene of an accident through to emergency care, surgery, and rehabilitation, and learned about the long-term impacts of preventable injuries.

Students also had the chance to hear first-hand from trauma survivors, whose powerful personal stories highlighted how one decision can change a life forever. These experiences encouraged students to reflect on their own choices and the importance of personal responsibility when it comes to safety.

The day was a highly engaging and thought-provoking extension to our Health and Wellbeing studies, helping students connect classroom learning to real-world consequences. We thank the staff at Lyell McEwin Hospital for their time, expertise, and commitment to educating young people about injury prevention.

To the ICT team, Nathan, Tara and Matt - your patience, trust and understanding about all the filming, converting and space I'm taking up on your server is beyond amazing.





SCIENCE NEWS

Goldilocks and the Bear-able Planets - Decoding Our Solar System

Delivered by the Australian Space Discovery Centre

During Science Week, our Year 8 Ignite students had an out-of-this-world experience exploring the wonders of our Solar System in an engaging session titled "Goldilocks and the Bear-able Planets." This interactive activity, delivered virtually by the Australian Space Discovery Centre, took students on an astronomical adventure to understand what makes a planet "just right" for life.

Students learnt about the Goldilocks Zone – the sweet spot in space where conditions are perfect for liquid water, and potentially, life! They explored the differences between rocky planets, gas giants, and icy worlds, and compared their sizes and distances from the Sun using a brand-new unit of measurement: The Astronomical Unit (AU).


One of the highlights was creating a Pocket Solar System – a hands-on activity where students built their own scale model of the Solar System. This brought to life the vast distances between planets, transforming abstract numbers into something students could hold and understand.

The session also included a virtual tour using NASA's Eyes on the Solar System, where students zoomed across planets, moons, and beyond, guided by a Space Communicator from the Australian Space Discovery Centre.

This immersive experience not only sparked curiosity but also deepened students' appreciation for the incredible scale and complexity of our cosmic neighbourhood.

Who knows - maybe the next great space explorer is sitting in our classroom right now!

In the "How Do You Science? Decoding the Universe-Exploring the unknown with nature's hidden language," competitions, students expressed their ideas through posters and dioramas. Their clever thinking, big imaginations, and unique perspectives showed the many ways we all connect with science.

Secondary Science Week

During Week 4 (II-I5 August), our school celebrated Science Week with the exciting national theme "Decoding the Universe" - an exploration of nature's hidden language and the mysteries of the world around us.

Across the week, students were immersed in a variety of thought-provoking and hands-on activities designed to challenge their thinking and ignite curiosity. Through their science classes, they tackled puzzles and participated in engaging practical sessions that brought scientific concepts to life.

Lunchtime activities added an extra layer of excitement featuring a diverse range of experiences such as Vortex Rockets, Periodic Table Scrabble, and a fast-paced Brain Break Quiz that tested students' general science knowledge in a fun, competitive format.

Science Week 2025 was a fantastic opportunity for students to immerse themselves in scientific thinking, creativity, and problem-solving. The enthusiasm and curiosity shown by students across all year levels made it a memorable celebration of the power and wonder of science.

Year 12 Biology Students Inspire Young Scientists Through Hands-On Learning

As part of their Integrated Learning program in Biology, our Year 12 students recently took on the role of science mentors, guiding enthusiastic Year 2 and Year 3 students through a series of fun and engaging activities designed to make scientific concepts come alive.

In one vibrant session, the younger students explored the concept of diffusion. After sharing their existing knowledge, they conducted a simple yet eye-catching experiment using M&Ms arranged around a plate. When warm water was added to the centre, the colours began to spread and blend, creating a striking visual that helped students understand how diffusion works in a memorable and meaningful way.

Another highlight was the food web activity, where students explored ecosystems and the connections between living things. Working in small groups, the younger students were given a collection of animal and plant cards. With the help of their Year 12 mentors, they sorted through the cards to consider predator-prey relationships, gradually building their own food webs. This hands-on approach allowed students to visualise how each organism fits into the larger ecosystem.

Another session included an experiment on plant biology, specifically focusing on transpiration. Students paired up to observe how water moves through plants by placing white carnations in coloured water. Over time, the petals absorbed the dye, revealing the hidden process of water transport in a colourful and engaging way.

These cross-age sessions not only enriched the learning experience for the younger students but also gave our Year 12s a valuable opportunity to practise leadership, communication, and peer mentoring – all while reinforcing their own understanding of key biological concepts.
